Link with the Past.
Mr Christopher Wilkinson and his wife were visiting the village recently. He is the grandson of Dr.Postlethwaite who practised medicine in the village up to the 1940s and who lived at "Nutshell"; he later built 'Bluebells'. Mr Wilkinson grew up in Brentor (he is now in his 70s). In 1923 at the age of 18 months he was taken to the usa by his parents who decided to emigrate. His mother (Dr. Postlethwaite's daughter) was pregnant and on the voyage over the Atlantic was very sea-sick. Because she was ill, she was not allowed to land in New York but was detained in the notorious Ellis Island. Eventually through the efforts of an emigre lawyer, she was released but the baby (a little girl) died and she herself subsequently died of pneumonia. Mr Wilkinson was sent home alone by Atlantic liner, in the care of a stewardess, and was brought up in Brentor by his grandparents; he became known as Christopher Postlethwaits locally. He never saw his father again though whilst in the Merchant Navy he spoke on the telephone to him on one occasion during the last war: cont....

cont.. Christopher Wilkinson now lives in Leicestershire and has children and grandchildren; he spent some time during his recent visit tidying his grandparent's graves and planting a rosemery bush for remembrance.
