Parking in the Village. There has been in recent months considerable comment in the village about the danger of parking cars on the corner by the War Memorial above the chute; it may be visitors. But it certainly can be disconcerting, particularly at night to round the corner from the Lydford Road and be confronted immediately with a sizeable vehicle. It is certainly dangerous, particularly if a car approaches from the Mary Tavy direction at the same time and drives right of the War Memorial. The parked car could be vulnerable and as there is usually

plenty of space down the road, the hazard seems unnecessary.

Citizen's Advice Bureau.
Closure of Rural Post Offices. The future of rural post offices is being considered; if they close it can have a devastating effect on rural communities. People collecting benefits and pensions may have to travel many miles for this service.

It has been suggested that pensions and benefits could be paid into client's Bank or Building Society account. Many people do not have this facility but, where they have, obtaining cash can be very difficult. The local economy will also suffer; small shops, small businesses etc. People will not shop locally and consequently, in time, these will close.

Transport is also a problem as buses and trains are non-existent in many areas. Where there is public transport from village to town, extra cost is involved.
