A 'New' Bridleway on Bowden

The Devon County Council has now opened up a bridleway across the eastern side of Bowden Down following the line of a path that appeared on nineteenth century maps. This substantial track is a restricted bridleway which is out of bounds to motorised vehicles. The Brentor Commons Association is responsible for preventing the encroachment

of vegetation onto the track and the Devon County Council is responsible for the maintenance of the track surface.

On leaving Bowden Down, the track continues northwards progressing via a holloway to Longham Ford on the River Lyd. This is a beautiful walk which links naturally to the public footpath through Langstone Woods and back to Brentor Village. I hope that more of you will now be able to enjoy this western wild side of Brentor.

Outing to Eden January 23 2010

There has been a very good response to the idea of a joint outing between our churches, so now it is time to confirm details: I have booked Holman's Coach (49 seater) and they will be picking up from Brentor,(war memorial) Tavistock (Bedford Hotel) and Gulworthy (nr church). the coach will pick up from Brentor at 12noon, continuing to Tavistock for approx 12.15pm and Gulworthy 12.30pm. We plan to be at Eden by 2.00pm and can park close to the entrance, in the coach park. Entry for residents of Devon and Cornwall on that day will be half price, providing you bring proof of residence and photo ID. Costs therefore will be Adults £8.00/Seniors 60+ £5.00/students in full time education over 18years £4.00/Under 18yrs in full time education FOC (or pay £2.00 for annual pass). All these prices will give you 12 months entry. Obviously if you already have a pass you can use this and not pay again! Apart from the site, the ice skating rink (capacity 245) will be open and skating can be booked beforehand using the website or by phoning 01726 811972., or you can book on arrival. We plan to arrive at approx 2.00pm and leave again at approx.6.00pm returning home by 8.00pm, dropping off en route!

The coach costs £5 per seat and this needs to be paid by Sunday 20 December, to guarantee your place on the bus. Please put your money in an envelope clearly marked with your name, address, and telephone no. and /or email address and please post into my postbox.

Your seat will then be confirmed to you by Sally. Please contact me if you have any further queries.

Gill Gorbutt - a founding editor of the Brentor News It is a sad coincidence that the death of Gill Gorbutt at the beginning of November occurred in the same week as the 30th anniversary of the publication of the very first edition of the Brentor News.

Gill and her husband David were founding editors of the Brentor News in 1979. They had moved into the Station House, Brentor in 1975 and soon became involved in the community life of the village. In February 1978 the village experienced a severe blizzard which blocked all access roads with 2 metre snow drifts and cut off telephones and electricity and water supplies for several days. These events accelerated the establishment of the Brentor Community Centre by a small group led by Gill & David. A Community Shop, run by volunteers, was set up in the Church Hall by August 1978 and the substantial organisation required depended on good communication.. In the age before the internet and mobile phones (or even the wide distribution of household phones!), this meant the regular distribution of a Newsletter.

After experimenting with a broadsheet posted on the village notice boards, the Brentor News was first published and circulated to all households in November 1979. In those early days, the Brentor News was typed up from handwritten notes onto a stencil and was printed on a small 'Roneo' printer turned by hand. With 180 copies of 4 or 6 page issues which also had to be collated and stapled this was a tedious and exhausting process which required great dedication! As well as continuing in this role for six years, Gill was very active in organising the Community Shop and encouraging the development of a playgroup, youth club and many community events in Brentor. All this while raising two children (Emma & Tom) who had been born since Gill & David arrived in Brentor.

Gill's strength and energy also enabled her to raise awareness of wider issues that had an impact on local life at a time of considerable national and international upheaval. She was central to lively debates in the village on the inadequacies of planning for civil defence in the event of nuclear war. She provided respite holidays at Station House for miners' families at the time of the national strike. She also organised the collection and delivery of warm clothing for the winter women's vigil at Greenham Common.

In her dealings with people she always exhibited a warmth and a sincere interest in their concerns and their views, even when there was disagreement. Gill & David moved from Brentor to Tavistock in November 1987. Gill's many and varied contributions to the community life of Tavistock were recognised by her election as Mayor in 1997 and by her later appointment as an Honoured Burger of the town. The final tribute to her was paid by nearly three hundred people who packed St Eustacius Church for her funeral on 16th November. She will be greatly missed.
