Funding the Improvement of the Village Hall

In January 2009 the Village Hall and Playing Field Committee agreed to go ahead with the replacement of the toilets, kitchen and store in the village hall. The existing ones are in a poor condition and will be demolished and rebuilt, along with a new entrance hall. The new building will be properly constructed, insulated and equipped to modern standards.

- New toilets will include a disabled person's toilet and nappy changing facility.
- There will be a much larger store so that our chairs and tables can be stored away from the main hall.
- The new entrance hall will provide easy access into the building for everyone. It will also be a useful place to hang coats and park baby buggies
- There will be a catering-quality kitchen, about 1-1/2 times the size of the current one.

All this will be built as a self-supporting structure, so that if the main hall has to be replaced in the future the new parts will be kept and incorporated into the new design.

Other work will be carried out on the main hall to slow down its deterioration and the whole building will be re-wired and painted.

All this work will cost in the region of £150,000, so how will this be financed?

- West Devon Borough Council has agreed to provide £30,000 towards the project.
- The village hall committee already has £10,000 of its own funds set aside for the work
- Several other applications for large grants towards the work have been made
- Local fund raising will continue
- The Parish Council has decided to make a contribution of up to £45,000 towards the work, provided that this is supported through a referendum

The support of the parish council is seen as critical by some potential funders Should the Parish Council's proposal to support the improvement of the hall be rejected this will rule out most funding sources as they all are keen to see evidence of local support. We will then be faced with the hall having only a limited future.

If you want to find out more about the proposals then come along to the village hall on 7 March between 10.30 and 12.00 when plans will be on display and committee members will be happy to discuss them with you.

Gubbins ghosts and gramarye!

Adrian Shaw, who is in his twelfth year as the National Trust Head Warden at Lydford Gorge, gave an absorbing communication on the flora fauna, history, spooks, sprites and spectres of Lydford Gorge to a well attended Brentor Garden Club meeting.

Adrian told us that Lydford Gorge is known as a 'Site of Special Scientific Interest' (SSSI) because of the geology formation, lichens, bryophyte (mosses), fungi, wild orchid and other florae. Many of us have walked through the Gorge accompanied by the smell of wild garlic, seen the invasive skunk cabbage and admired the bluebells, but to collect some intimate details about the gorge, from such a knowledgeable person, is surely a bonus.

The Head Wardens' main management objectives are to preserve the Sessile Oak and remove non indigenous shrubs and plants. Checking the handrails, footpaths, signs, rock face, tree and branch damage is part and parcel of the Head Warden's job.

With the recent snow this year the footpaths were littered with fallen trees and branches and that has meant a lot of hard work for the Wardens and their volunteers looking after 116 acres - all useful tools/equipment have to be manually carried into the gorge. The river Lyd can rise quickly with severe rainfall and occasionally a section of the three mile circular walk has to be closed because of bridge damage and flooded footpaths.

Regular maintenance is mandatory in order to provide

the safest possible public access to 63.000 to 65,000 visitors per year.

Lydford Gorge was given to the National Trust by Squire Radford in 1943 and opened for the public to enjoy in 1947. The gorge has been etched out and sculptured by a constant pounding of escaping boulders and stones flowing along the river over a 450,000 year period; one of its' main features being the Devil's Cauldron carved out over a period of 10,000 years. The White Lady waterfall that at one time was called the 'Cascade' is an attractive feature. Air Ambulance and the Fire Brigade are important to the gorge and they have had very occasional access, over the years, to assist with visitor accidents.

Wildlife is in abundance in the gorge – badger, fox, deer (roe and red), bats, otters and many other mammals. A well managed bird hide, where a variety of birds can be viewed, has been erected along an old railway line that used to run along the edge of the gorge. Tawny owl has been heard, dipper has been seen and buzzard, woodpecker, raven and many other birds can be easily sighted by the visitor.

The gorge has, in the past, provided important historical defensive positions and acted as a fortification when the Vikings attacked; at one time there was a Norman castle and in 1195 a medieval castle was built. The Gubbins – a peculiar race of people and said to be able to outrun a horse – were early inhabitants of Lydford Gorge and their crimes were rife! The Lydford (castle) prison has many ghosts – the jailer of the prison haunts the doorways, Judge Jeffries (the hanging judge) has taken the form of a black pig – only to be seen on a dark night, Lady Howard (questionable number of deceased husbands) haunts the road between Lydford to Okehampton and Captain Jack, an infamous highwayman (hanged on nearby Gibbet Hill) are just a few. What are the 'orbs' (small opalescent spheres) that can occasionally be seen on digital photographs - spirits? Adrian admits to seeing them for real!

Pictures.

Contact details

Contact details (e.g. e-mail addresses, phone numbers) will only be included in the website with the permission of the individuals concerned. All email addresses are disguised ('obfuscated') automatically.

Directory of Permissions

For contact details we are keeping a 'Directory of Permissions' given to the editors of web pages and Brentor News. We will assume that permissions given will stand until they are specifically withdrawn. Remember - this is an 'opt in' system and it is up to you to keep it up-to-date!
