BRENTOR VILLAGE PHONE BOX

Villagers may be unaware that British Telecom has posted a notice in the phone box stating that:

"A detailed survey has shown that this kiosk is not being used sufficiently to continue the service at this location."

The notice goes on to say that if the local community would like to maintain telephone service, it would be necessary for it to be subsidised. However, if service were not to be considered necessary then the kiosk alone could be transferred to the local community for the sum of £1, under BT Payphones' "Adopt-a-Kiosk" scheme (web site below).

The Parish Council will be considering this issue at its next meeting on 23rd November and Parishioners may wish to give this some thought before then in order that the Councillors have some idea of local feeling on the issue. Having been co-opted to the Council as recently as last May, I look forward to seeing the level of feedback.

In some 12 years in the village I have to confess that I have not used the kiosk more than a couple of times, to report a fault on our home phone, although BT records show 65 calls in the past 12 months. Given that the centre of the village is a mobile signal free zone, (not apparently accepted by BT Payphones) and that cordless home phones do not work during power cuts, it may be that the phone box could be seen as an emergency service.

If, however, it is only the iconic presence of the red box that is important, then possibly adoption would be the way forward. Whatever path is chosen, time is of the essence.

We hope to have use of the hall again by mid April 2010 and look forward to some major reopening events in May!

Funding is still being sought from for the remaining £9,000 needed to complete the repairs and redecoration of the main hall building.

Meeting held on 17 September 2009 "The Daffodil Project at Cotehele"


We were lucky enough to have David Bouch, the Head Gardener at the National Trust's Cotehele House to come and talk to us about daffodils. David has a host of experience in horticulture having worked in the gardens at Anthony House in south-east Cornwall and Trelissick Gardens near Truro, before executing his talents at the 14 acres of estate at Cotehele.

We were astounded to learn that there are over 22,000 varieties of daffodil; with over 270 varieties just at Cotehele itself! Many are thought to originate from the only truly native species narcissus pseudonarcissus. The varieties are split into 13 sections, differentiated by their colours, petal shape, whether they are a double or single flower or by the length of the trumpet in ratio to the petals. David and his gardeners are trying to learn as much as possible about the varieties at Cotehele, but they have to be quick as they only flower for about six weeks. They have a contact in Scotland who can identify 13,000 different varieties before having to refer to any book!

Daffodils have been grown as an industry in the Tamar Valley for the past 100 years or more. The south facing slopes and high rainfall are perfect growing conditions for daffodils, and it was a useful crop to be grown on the steep slopes where nothing else would thrive. In the days before lorries the blooms were sent by river to Plymouth, to be transported up to London by train to be sold. Nowadays, the flowers are available in a tight 'pencil' bloom, but back then they were sold in full flower, and thus there was a faster turnover.

The War Memorial in the centre of Brentor records the names of the men from this village who gave their lives for King and Country in the First World War. The recently released 1911 Census can be linked with earlier census records to give an insight into the lives and positions of only a few of them.

ROBERT A FRENCH SMITH was the son of the vicar, Robert Joseph French Smith. In 1911 the family lived in the Vicarage in Brentor, a house of 10 rooms. Young Robert, 16 at the time of the census, was living with his two sisters, Margaret (18) and Kathleen (13), his mother Emma (59) and father Robert (59). Emma had been born in London, Robert Snr in Ireland and all the children in Brentor. Their servant, Eliza Fry was 18 and had been born in North Tawton.
