Over 2000 people in Tavistock were employed in various mines and 6000 in the area in industries connected with mining..... The importance of manganese mining near Brentor doubled the populations of the villages between Lewtrenchard and Coryton between 1801 and 1851, as much as 800 tons of manganese being mined in one year and taken by waggon to Morwellham Early in the 19th century, the area was a principal source of manganese for glass manufacture and later supplied the stell industry when it began on a large scale......

ENDPIECE

I write in a week when the CBI (the employers organisation) predicts that unemployment will rise to about 34 million by next year. Unemployment is likely to rise for the 16-19 year olds faster than any other group. By this summer there could be 900,000 out of work or unable to get a job and one estimate suggests that by July 1982 there will be 1.8 millions in the 16-19 age group alone who are unemployed. In Brentor and West Devon we will not stand apart from this situation. What is to be done?

We are currently being asked to comment on the Tavistock and District structure plan. The planners want us to tell them how we want this area to develop over the next few years. There are suggestions about whether we should have more estates (Bishopsmead?) or more factories wxxxxThen again, for those who wish to see nil growth, the time to say it is now.

My response would begin from the idea that people have a right to socially useful work. I would like to see the County and District Councils do things which help to promote this idea . What sort of projects have I in mind? Well, the Waste Savers in Tavistock seems a good place to start ... at least in terms of ideas . This weekend I am going to a meeting near Dartington on Community Energy schemes. These sorts of project sometimes need official backing to get them going even when they might create much needed jobs. Perhaps the new Community Enterprise Scheme may help, but at the moment its only for 30,000 people. in the whole country - less than the monthly increase in unemployment.

Is there anything we can do? Or will we be content to notice that there are less visitors to the south west this summer? I would be interested in suggestions or your responses.
