Devon County Council have now sent a reply to the criticisms of the War Emergency Plan which were sent in August, Mr J.H. Basson, the County Emergency Officer replied in a letter... In addition the County intends to run short courses for the Chairman of Parish War Emergency Committees.

During October we were able to he r a great deal about Christian communities in the Third World.

Canon Nelson Omusala from the diocese of Maseno North in Kenya talked to us at the beginning of the month about the work of the Church in Africa and then at the Team Service, three weeks later, the Rector spake about India.

The Team Service was a great success in spite of the absence through illness of the guest speaker, the Rev. Cyril Eason, Area Secretary of the United Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. Some 70 people attended the morning service and enjoyed the combined choirs of Lydford and Brentor who led the singing. Afterwards, hot coffee in the Church Hall warmed us all up (following the failure of the heating in the Church!) and we were able to meet for a pleasant social half-hour some of the folk from the other three parishes in the Team.

Another highlight of the month of October was the baptism service, conducted by Deaconess Ormsby, for two recent arrivals in the Parish - Jamie Dreher and Andrew Barge. This service also resulted in a full church, with plenty of parishioners to welcome these two additions to the family of Christ Church.

November seems likely to be a less eventful month than the last. But perhaps it will give us an opportunity of beginning to think about the real meaning and significance of the great Christian festival of Christmas. There will no doubt be plenty of reminders for us all of the more mundane aspects of this public holiday - so that we are unlikely to be left unaware of its approach!
