

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Tavistock and Local District Plan - This is a guide to proposed development in this area between now and 1991. The consultation period for this plan is from Fovember 11th to December 31st. If anyone is interested in seeing the plan the Parish Council has a copy.

St Michael's Barrier - The hoped for addition of a safety barrier before the kissing gate entrance to the Tor will not be erected for the time being. The Highways Committee have declined to make any alterations beyond those already done.

The Parish Council had already agreed that this barrier was one of the main safety improvements to the entrance to avoid any further tragedy like that of two years ago. Because safety is still a priority, the Parish Council have reserved the right to disagree with the Highways Committee's conclusions and to take up the matter again at some later date.

Jets over Brentor - A letter received by the Parish Council from Sir Peter Mills, in reply to theirs, expressed sympathy over the low flying jets that trouble Brentor. He suggested that perhaps a record could be kept of the date, time and place of low flying aircraft and whether they were considered dangerous. This matter could then be looked into. Brentor is one of the designated low flying practice areas, but these areas are on a rota basis. If you take note of any low flying aeroplanes, please give the details to the Parish Council.

Citizens' Advice Bureau - The Parish Council has made its annual donation to the Citizens' Advice Bureau £20 this year. This is to assist in its expenditure. The Council sees it as a very worth-while facility which needs support.

Ancient Mile Stone - Damage has been done to the ancient mile stone on the left hand side of the Lydford to Tavistock road, beyond the Burn Lane turn off to Brentor and just before the right hand turning towards Rowden. The Parish Council ask that care should be taken of this old stone and if further damage is witnessed could they be told.

The Goery Seat Plants - The Parish Council would kike to thank the WI and friends for their great care of the plants around this seat. They are all well supported and ready to face the winter. Special thanks too for the help also given by Mr Blowey Senior.

CHRISTIAN UNITY Some time ago in the Brentor News I expressed a certain amount of frustration that efforts to bring about tangible unity between the Church of England and some of the Free Churches had, at any rate for the forseeable future, come to nought.
It seemed that we, at the 'grass roots' should stir ourselves to bring about within our own community what discussions within the centrally heated precincts of Church House, Westminster had failed to achieve. This view was, in general, supported when it was put before the Parochial Church Council and it was agreed that something should be done. Since then informal approaches have been made to various people in order to try and find out how we might foster a Brentor Christian Community. Such a body of local people might include all those who feel themselves committed to the Christian creed, whatever denomination they might committed to the Christian creed, whatever denomination they might formally, or informally, belong; indeed perhaps some who do not feel committed at present, might join in. The aim would be to discuss and exchange views in the first instance - perhaps ultimately to worship together in a united way on a regular basis? The only tangible step in this direction which can be reported here and now is that as from Monday 6th December a series of fortnightly studies and discussions are commencing in the Methodist School Room in Brentor at 7.30 p.m. The subject is to be "The Journeys of St Paul" and the studies are to be led by Mr John Hill, a Methodist local preacher and former missionary worker. Mr Hill's approach to his subject is both academic and realistic; he plans to follow the three journeys of St Paul and discuss the issues which arise at the various places on his travels.

Some folk, other than those who form part of the local Methodist congregation, have been attending these study groups in past winters but it is hoped to enlarge this circle as a fist step towards doing more things together. The Chapel Stewards, Mr Sillifant and Mrs Claringbold are issuing an invitation to all of us to attend this 1982/3 series; it could offer a good opportunity for us to get to know each other better in an informal atmosphere - particularly as we drink the cup of tea which follows the study! Please do try to come along. In the meantime please be thinking about the theme of Christian Unity and what it may be possible to do towards achieving that unity, at

DEVON ASSOCIATION OF PARISH COUNCILS I recently represented Brentor Parish Council at the AGM of the above. Although the morning session of the meeting was perhaps a little dull - much as the AGM of any organisation tends to be - the afternoon session was well worth the journey to Barnstaple. A platform Panel of speakers consisted of Mr J Ormerod, Assistant Chief Constable, Mr J Basson, Emergency Officer, Mr J Hamson, Director of Social Services and Mr Tony Day, Secretary of Exeter Community Health Council.
