Dear Brentor News...

I am saddened by the hostile reception often given by many people in our society to responsible, thinking, and caring people who gather together with the common purpose of influencing their fellows and their governments against the manufacture and use of nuclear weapons.

It seems to be very easy and convenient for some, in order to avoid some very painful soul searching and fact finding, to dismiss anyone or any organlocation committed to peace and the rejection of nuclear weapons, as cranks, communists, traitors, etc., etc., etc.

I just cannot believe that Churches, responsible politicians and political parties can be dismissed thus, and by the same token, I cannot dismiss the growing number of ordinary people who simply love their children - and yours too - and who desperately want to ensure that those children will have the chance, not only to live, but to enjoy this beautiful world we live in. For their sakes it cannot - it MUST NOT - be reduced to a poisoned, ugly, radioactive desert.

Surely we can prevent this nightmare from becoming a reality?? With that hope in mind I shall attend the meeting in the Village Hall on Wednesday February 9th, and it, I hope, will help me - and you take some positive, constructive action to enable us to protect ourselves, our children and grandchildren against the growing threat of nuclear weapons.

I am just an ordinary sort of man, I Don't think I'm a crank or a religious zealot, and I'm not very political either; I enpy a Guinness and an occasional cigarette and I don't think it's particularly contraversial to say that I love my children --- and I'm certainly no saint! - 3. Make sure back door is bolted and all electric switches turned off.

To ensure that the Church Hall remains in good condition and that organisations using it are able to enjoy the facilities to the full, the Church Hall Committee asks you if you will:-

- 1. Record your bookings of the Hall on the calendar in the Brentor Post Office (including regular users).
- 2. Use kitchen for coffee/tea/food preparation ONLY.
- 3. Smoke only on platform, not in main hall or kitchen.
- 4. Please keep warm, but do turn off gas fires when the use of these is not essential.
- 5. Please leave heater in pano turned on.
- 6. Please report breakages, etc. to Secretary or Treasurer so that repairs can be made.
- 7. Apart from about 12 chairs, store the rest in porch on leaving.

- 6. Other wooden chairs, etc. to be kept on platform and property belonging to organisations to be put in cupboards provided.
- 9. Before leaving ensure back door is bolted, gas fires turned off, all lights switched off.
- 10. Hall Key to be collected from and returned to the Post Office.

A very helpful discussion took place on how best to further the cause of Christian unity locally; emphasis was laid by a number of people on the importance of fostering the areas of common ground which exist within

the various Christian disciplines represented.

The view was expressed that one of the most helpful ways forward within the village was for an ecumenical group to work together on a practical project. There was general agreement to this idea and, as a result, it was decided there and then to set about organising a Good Neighbour aroup to draw up a scheme for co-ordinating those who were ready and will-ing to provide help to assist those who may from time to time require help, whether transport, fetching shopping, doctors' prescriptions or the like. It is hoped to discuss the proposed scheme im more detail at a further meeting of the Group which will take place at 7.30 p.m. on Thursday: 10th February at Rose Cottage, The Court, Brentor by kind invitation of Miss Edna Dunn.

The following Thursday, 17th February, is the first in Lent and it is planned to hold a series of weekly discussions commencing on that day and on each Thursday in Lent. A different member of the Group will lead the discussion each Thursday and it is hoped to follow an agreed prepared programme. All will be welcome to come to these meetings which will be held informally either in local houses or in one of the local halls, depending on the numbers likely to attend. Details will be circulated in due course.

It is hoped that more detailed information on the Good Neighbour project will be available too in the near future and in any case by the time the March issue of the Brentor News is published.
