Planning - It was decided that all Parish Councillors should, in future, be informed in advance, of all planning applications in the village. They will then be able to call a special council meeting on any plan, if they think it is necessary, before a final decision is made, by the Parish Council.

He is in charge of Footpaths and bridlepaths and keeps an eye on motorbike scrambling, illegal parking and the general state and well being of the moor.

Parish War Emergency Plan - As there is no one who wishes to take on the responsibility of home defence advisor or chairman of the home defence committee, the Parish Council has decided on a full Council approach. All Parish Councillors will be involved and keep the rest of the village informed.

Life Saver Course

It is now possible, if there is enough interest, for Frentor to have it's own Life Saver Course. This would be one session of approximately 2 hours, which includes a video presentation as well as practical training. It stems from the Fern Eritton Safety Campaign on E.E.C. South est.

The training is given, free of charge, by experts from Ambulance, Police and Road Safety Services and the Eritish Heart foundation and covers the theory and practice of Accident prevention in the home, at play and on the road; control of an accident scene; calling energe by services; Amergency aid to the casualties, Resuscitation and treatment of shock etc.

Recipe

Having seen so many people with marrows, this year, which they have either grown or bid for at Harvest Auctions, I wondered if any-one would find the following recipe of use.

MARROW AND LEMON CURD

41bs Marrows, peeled and cubed
3½ lbs Suger
8oz Butter
6 Lemons

Steam the marrow until quite tender then drain very thoroughly. Mash or liquidize until smooth. Return to pan, adding suger, butter, grated rind and jmice of lemons. Heat gently, stirring until butter and suger have dissolved. Bring the mixture almost to the boiling point, then simmer for about 30 minutes, stirring all the time.

Pot into warmed jars, cover when cold.

This makes a very nice filling for tarts and flans and keeps 4 to 6mhs.

Makes approximately 3 to 4 lbs.
