Brentor's Broadband - Here's the Good News and the Bad News

At last those of us in Brentor who can't access Airband should be getting superfast fibre broadband courtesy of the government's Universal Service Obligation (USO) scheme. But how can it be that all the residents of West Blackdown and at least one in Station View have been offered free connection to Brentor's new fibre-to-the-premises broadband network, but others in the village centre a few hundred metres away are being asked to pay between £8,358 and £36,871 to be connected to the same network?

Our new network will involve burying a fibre cable under the moor from Mary Tavy to West Blackdown — apparently this is the expensive part of the installation. From there onwards the fibre will be hung on existing telephone poles — a relatively cheap process. It has already been done free of charge by BT to hamlets as small as Horndon and Cudliptown.

Openreach/BT have told everyone in West Blackdown that, unless there are unforeseen issues with the installation, connection will be free, paid for by USO funding of up to £6,800 per property. There have already been two detailed surveys carried out by Openreach surveyors and notices have appeared on telephone poles advising of work being done relating to the new fibre network, so it really does look as if it will be happening soon.

But what is to happen in the rest of Brentor and other areas of the parish such as Liddaton? Residents in these areas who are eligible for Universal Service Obligation scheme are not likely to agree to pay the vast sums being quoted for connection. Probably the best way forward will be to follow West Blackdown's example and band together to raise merry hell with our local MP, Ofcom, BT, Openreach and anyone else they can think of! After all, residents in West Blackdown were originally quoted £42,457.20 to be connected, but when they started to make a fuss the price miraculously reduced to zero.

On 15th October Ofcom announced that it is setting up an investigation into how the USO scheme is being implemented by BT. In particular the legislation requires BT to take into account that costs can be shared among customers who could use the same infrastructure. Ofcom is concerned that BT may not be complying with the USO regulations when it assesses excess costs for a given connection. This apparently results in some customers' quotes for a connection being higher than necessary! Those of us in Brentor who have had outrageous quotes should definitely be contacting Ofcom!

News from Brentor Commons

Work has recommenced on Brentor Commons following the summer months when we take a natural break. We use this time to allow our wildlife the space to breed, grow and re-establish itself across the 48 acres that comprise Bowden and Liddaton Downs.

There is a natural rhythm about the work that follows the seasons. By the end of March we have stopped work to allow birds, mammals, insects and plants their period to reproduce, grow, spread their seeds and bring up their young in peace. This is how it has always has been in the past and is good practice.

In autumn we can now roll the bracken to reduce its vigour and allow the moor grasses to grow through. The birds have fledged their young, some have stayed while others moved south through Europe to Africa like the grasshopper warblers and cuckoos.

With help from the Tavistock Taskforce we have coppiced more of the invasive willow around the Liddaton pond thus allowing a little bit more light in. This is a gentle process as we do not want to remove all of it as it is a very important habitat in its own right. Work to keep areas of the Holloway clear have been completed, coppicing of hazel, hedgelaying and constructing 'dead hedges' with the resulting 'brash' is continuing for a few months using monies from the National Lottery Heritage Fund grant. Other work planned includes improving the small parking area by the entry to the Holloway, creating a 'scrape', which is a a place that will allow water to collect, near the wet area on Bowden Down and more planting of heathers and other indigenous trees.

There's still plenty to do including checking the dormouse nesting boxes, mine shaft protection fences, ash die back issues, paths where they become muddy and impassable due to nearby springs and the inevitable Fly-tipping of rubbish.



Please go and have a wander around. Although the colours are not so spring and summer vivid, the autumnal browns, oranges and russets are subtle and beautiful. Spiders webs collectively envelope the gorse in the mornings, linnets flock and roe and red deer are seen regularly on both downs....it is a wonderful place.

The service is at 4.30pm at Christ Church on 1st November, and if you are unable to attend but would like any names read out please send them to helen@brentorchurch.org.uk and we will light candles for them. The service will be recorded and will be available online later via the Brentor Church website, streamed services, although the names will not be broadcast.

Remembrance

There will be a short service for Remembrance at Christ Church at the usual service time of 9.45am (space is limited so please let me know if you would like to attend) and the Act of Remembrance will be at Brentor War Memorial at 10.50am. In accordance with government restrictions there will be 6 taking part in the Act of Remembrance, representing the church, the parish council and of course the Royal British Legion. Social distancing must be observed and a record kept for NHS Test and Trace.
